2001-2009

Average Time to Program Completion Since 2001
(Includes completion of all requirements including internship):

- Students entering with a Masters' Degree (N = 3):
 - Mean = 6.25 years.
 - Median = 6.0 years.

- Students entering with a Bachelors' Degree (N = 20):
 - Mean = 8.26 years.
 - Median = 7.0 years.

- Percentage of students completing program in
 - 5 years: 5%
 - 6 years: 27%
 - 7 years: 18%
 - > 7 years: 45%

- However, of those students who entered between 1999 and 2001 (and should have finished by academic year 2006-07 if they finished in 6 years; N =11), 2 finished in 5 years (25%), 5 finished in 6 years (62.5%), and one is in the 7th year (12.5%). In addition, one student finished with a Master's degree, one transferred to another school closer to home, and one left for personal reasons. Thus, of those who continued in the program (N = 8), 87.5% finished in 6 years or less.

Program Costs and Funding Information

Tuition:

- **The program guarantees 100% paid tuition for the first five academic years of the graduate program to all students who are in good standing with the program.**
- 2009-10 Full-time Graduate Student Tuition:
 - Minnesota Residents: \$5606/semester
 - Non-Residents: \$9155/semester
 - Graduate Students employed as research or teaching assistants qualify for in-state residency tuition.

Fees:

- University Fee: \$600/semester (paid as part of funding package)
- Student Services Fee: \$348.41/semester (student's responsibility)
- CLA Technology Fee: \$105/semester (student's responsibility)

Graduate Student Funding Packages:

Funding packages for 2009-10 incoming first-year students include the following benefits:

- Paid tuition during the academic year
- Payment of the \$600/semester University Fee
 - Students must pay other fees.
- Subsidized health insurance
 - Students pay \$177/year for comprehensive health and dental benefits.
- Salary/Stipend
 - Mean Stipend for Incoming 2009 Students = \$15,064
 - Range = \$13,845-\$22,000
 - Stipends vary depending on source of funds.
 - Sources include:
 - Paid teaching assistant and section leader positions (25%-50% time)
 - Paid research assistant positions (25%-50% time)
 - Competitive CLA and Graduate School awards and fellowships

Internship Acceptance Rates

- All students (100%) who have applied for internships since 2001 obtained a paid internship (N=21).
- Percentage obtaining their internship through the APPIC match: 90.5% (N = 19).
- Percentage obtaining an APA accredited internship: 90.5% (N = 19).
- Percentage completing a 1-year full-time internship: 95% (N = 20).
- Percentage completing a 2-year half-time internship: 5% (N = 1).

Student Attrition

- Since 1993-94, 20% of students who matriculated left the program prior to earning the Ph.D. degree (11/55).
 - Three of these students transferred to another program within the psychology department, and either completed their Ph.D.s in another area (N = 2) or continue to work toward the Ph.D. in the transfer area (N = 1).

Licensure

Among students graduating 2001-2009 (N = 24¹):

- 50% are licensed psychologists in Minnesota (N = 12).
- 21% are licensed psychologists in another U.S. state (N = 5; states include Colorado, Florida, Iowa, New Hampshire and Texas).
- 33% are not licensed as psychologists in any jurisdiction (N = 8).
